MOUVEMENT POUR DES ÉCOLES SANS VIOLENCES SEXUELLES

The Network continued its collaboration with the Canadian Women's Foundation within the *Mouvement pour des écoles sans violences sexuelles* (MESVS) as **coordinator and project manager**. This project is the Quebec hub of the national Building the Field of Teen Healthy Relationships program.

The Network also took part in the national "Shockproofing Communities" summit organized by the Canadian Women's Foundation and Women's Shelters Canada, where we were able to **present the progress** of our work and **share our experience** and advice with the Atlantic and Indigenous regional hubs.

We have launched an evaluation process for this project, the aim of which is to take stock of the work carried out and its impact, and to gauge current needs in the field, in order to plan the next steps.

ÉDUCONNEXION

The Peace Network has begun collaborating with Éduconnexion, a community organization in Montréal-Nord that works, among other things, on violence prevention. Our joint work in 2023 was organized around the symposium "What if Violence was Perceived as a Public Health Issue? The Path Towards Healing." This extremely important topic was addressed by a number of experts from a variety of disciplines, and mobilized stakeholders from the community, philanthropic and other sectors.

LEARNING AND NETWORKING EVENTS peace days launch

On September 21, in collaboration with the City of Montreal, we celebrated the International Day of Peace and launched Peace Days 2023 at a **networking breakfast**. The event was an opportunity to bring together many of our Peace Days partners in order to **strengthen their sense of belonging** to a unifying project.

We were honoured to hear Martine Musau Muele, Chair of the City's Executive Council, give a welcome speech that reflected our shared definition of peace as the presence of healthy relationships based on trust, respect, understanding, equity and reciprocity.

Our featured speaker was Stéphanie Germain, Executive Director of Éduconnexion, who highlighted the need to act together against violence in Montreal.

Following the speeches and prior to a networking opportunity, singer Maria-Lorraine Caluya gave a multilingual performance, including a song in her native Tagalog (a Filipino language).

SPEAKING AS EXPERTS

PANEL DISCUSSION PRESENTED BY THE CENTRE DE RESSOURCES SUR LA NON-VIOLENCE

The Peace Network took part in a panel discussion and round table on violence prevention, whose focus was on existing primary violence prevention programs. The event emphasized the importance of mental healt, appropriate since we believe that every primary violence prevention program should include a mental health component, as well as a component on the importance of culturally relevant psychosocial support.

This was part of a collaborative research project on the topic of primary violence prevention programs.

PANEL DISCUSSION AS PART OF PROJET EMPREINTES

The Network was invited to take part in a panel discussion aimed at young people aged 14 to 17, organized by ENSEMBLE for the respect of diversity. This was an opportunity to discuss sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, and key issues facing queer communities.

SPEAKING AS EXPERTS MESSAGE OF SOLIDARITY FROM CIVIL SOCIETY

Recognizing the growing divisions in our society in the wake of events in the Middle East, the Network decided to take advantage of its positioning as a key player in the peace movement and help Montreal communities through a unifying message affirming that they will not give in to hatred, will remain united despite their differences, and will not perpetuate or accept any form of violence.

The Message of Solidarity from Civil Society was drafted in collaboration with PLEDJ (Promoting Leadership for Empowerment, Development and Justice), following a process of reflection and discussion with numerous stakeholders. The process leading up to the release of this message also helps lay the foundation for an ongoing project, still in collaboration with PLEDJ, that will provide for concrete actions to be taken in response to realities on the ground, given the importance of ensuring that peaceful and respectful dialogue takes place.

The Message of Solidarity, a joint declaration signed by over 80 representatives of civil society organizations, community leaders and prominent members of the Montreal community, was officially launched at a press conference that took place in December.

MEDIATION AND CONFLICT RESOLUTION

The community environment is not immune from conflict. Demanding working conditions, lack of resources and misperceptions or misunderstandings can lead to difficulties in collaboration or communication, and to a breakdown in relationships.

Drawing on its expertise and experience in mediation and conflict resolution, the **Network provided support** to help re-establish relationships between community groups, and between representatives of the public and community sectors.

These sessions provided safe spaces for the exploration of underlying issues and interests, for self-expression and listening, and for the identification of solutions, all of which laid the groundwork for the **resumption of collaboration** among parties to the process.

ADVICE AND SUPPORT

Our partners can count on us to provide them with individualized support and advice, **aimed at building capacity and optimizing work and resources**.

In 2023, we shared our expertise in the development, marketing and promotion of services, as well as in work optimization. This form of one-to-one support is tremendously appreciated by our partners, as it gives them the opportunity to step back and take a critical look at how to improve their practices.

OUR PROFESSIONAL SERVICES

COMMUNICATIONS TRAINING

The coaching and support we provide to organizations in the field is designed to enable them to strengthen their capacities, have a greater impact and increase the scope of their actions in the field of peace.

Offering training to our partners is therefore part of our mission, and enables us to provide an appropriate response to concrete needs.

Over the years, we have identified communication needs among some of our partners. As part of our Peace Days initiative, we **offered free basic communications training to a pilot group representing a dozen organizations**.

The training covered the planning and creation of a communications campaign, using as an example the promotion of the organization's activity proposed in the 2023 program.

The session was led by Stéphanie Girouard, Communications Manager at the Network.

The initiative was made possible by the financial support of the Zeller Family Foundation.

COMMUNICATIONS

Our communications efforts are an important force for the Network whose objectives are to underscore the rigor of our work, help develop public awareness and a positive public image of our team and our initiatives, and they thereby help to position the Network as an influential player in the field of peace.

Our communication tools use clear language, targeted messages and attractive visuals in order to maximize their reach and impact. These are seen in multiple resources used by the Network: websites, reports, presentation documents, press releases and social media (Facebook, Instagram, Stories, LinkedIn, X). The development of a strong visual signature has been an important element in the creation of tools that not only generate visibility and public awareness, but also generate mobilization and a sense of belonging, for both the public and our partners. This is seen in tools such as our **marquee**, **t-shirt**, **bookmark and posters**.
